East Bay Community Energy

Te are excited to announce that East Bay Community Energy (EBCE) will be providing greener electricity to your home and/ or business starting in April—and at slightly lower rates! EBCE is a local, not-for-profit public agency that the City Council voted to join on October 24, 2019. EBCE has been supplying electricity throughout most of Alameda County since 2018, and this April all electric accounts in Newark will be enrolled in EBCE service unless customers opt out. (Customers can also opt UP to 100% renewable energy with EBCE for an additional \$0.01/kWhapproximately \$5/month more for the average home in EBCE's service area).

Community choice energy agencies, like EBCE, procure electric power on behalf of cities and counties to expand customer energy options; increase access to renewable energy: reduce electricity rates; and create local jobs through innovative programs and renewable energy projects.

Per California State law (AB 117), electricity accounts in Newark will be automatically enrolled with EBCE and placed on EBCE's Bright Choice service, which offers a 1% discount compared to PG&E's standard service and a minimum of 5% more renewable energy. For customers, everything else stays the same - PG&E will continue to administer energy transmission, distribution, repair work, and billing services. You will see EBCE's slightly lower charges on your monthly bill along with a credit from PG&E, since you will be purchasing from EBCE's energy supply rather than PG&E's (unless you opt out).

You will receive four enrollment notices from EBCE with additional information, one each month starting in February 2021. By now you should have received at least one enrollment notice in the mail from EBCE. Subsequent notices will arrive by either U.S. mail or email.

To recap:

- Starting this April, EBCE will become Newark's default supplier of electricity generation services;
- EBCE is a local public agency that provides greener electricity throughout Alameda County at slightly lower rates than PG&E's standard service:
- PG&E will continue to deliver the electricity through its transmission and distribution systems, and will continue to handle repairs and customer billing services;
- EBCE's electric generation charges will appear as a line-item on PG&E bills. These are not additional charges; they are replacement charges for what PG&E would have otherwise charged to generate your electricity;
- EBCE's enrollment process is automatic, so you probably won't even notice the change. Similarly, customers on PG&E discount programs (e.g., CARE, FERA, and/or Medical Baseline) do not need to re-enroll in these programs. They transfer automatically with EBCE service.

he Ohlone Community College District's Board of Trustees has affirmed the College's strong commitment to being an equity-based, anti-racist institution through the passing of Resolution No. 20/20-21 Commitment to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) at its February 10, 2021 meeting.

"This resolution solidifies our commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion by putting our continued and new actions into words and setting clear expectations and direction for the College," said Board Chair Richard Watters.

The College has made an even stronger commitment to equity and, inspired by the California Community College Chancellor's Call to Action is implementing strategic steps to meet Vision to Success goals to improving student success. These goals include but are not limited to increasing degree and certificate completers by 20%; increasing CSU/UC transfers by 35%; decreasing average number of units by 10%; increasing Career Technical Education students' employment by 15%; decreasing achievement gaps for underrepresented groups by 40%; and reducing regional achievement gaps for all measures through faculty and staff diversity as a driver for the educational achievement and the social mobility of students.
